



HO ARE THE VILLAGERS?

Anyone who's ever opened their eyes in our community immediately understands Miami is one of the most special places in the world for a

variety of reasons. Even though most recognize its special charm, the architecture found here often takes a backseat to our beaches and weather. But that doesn't mean it should be ignored - Coral Gables is home to some of unique and fascinating architecture! Unfortunately, as Miami continues to attract people from all over the globe, some of

our neighborhoods and communities are feeling pressure to develop, effectively destroying some of the historical architecture in the Coral Gables community. Luckily, The Villagers are here to help preserve our past for generations to come! The current president of The Villagers is Susan Medina, and she was so kind in helping me understand just who The Villagers are.

Founded in 1966, The Villagers is the oldest non-profit organization dedicated to historical preservation in Miami-Dade. They were birthed out of necessity, as the famously historical Douglas Entrance in Coral Gables was in jeopardy of being destroyed. In 1972, after a successful restoration



campaign on the Douglas Entrance, The Villagers expanded their role to saving many other local sites and eventually played a major role in the creation of a new historic preservation organization in Dade County - The Dade Heritage Trust.

The Villagers are still running strong, with over 200 members who participate in monthly meetings, and are focused on historic preservation Coral Gables and the rest of Dade County. The work they do is wholesome, empowering, and keeps our city gorgeous for generations to come.

PRESERVATION IS IMPORTANT - AND FUN!

Monthly meetings for The Villagers are held at historic sites, where members plan new preservation

projects, and enjoy speakers on a variety of preservation topics. These meetings are appreciated by everyone involved, as these historic venues absolutely adore having The Villagers on their premises, and always welcome the group with big smiles and open arms.

The members of The Villagers don't take historic preservation lightly, or even recreationally - they are serious about it. When speaking with Susan, she mentioned multiple times that members often plan personal vacations around preservation efforts, talk about dedication!

Although their monthly meetings are a cherished highlight, the events which The Villagers really get excited about are the Historic House tours and the Garden Tours. These tours allow the public to purchase tickets in order to visit and experience various venues throughout the community. The tours are their biggest revenue-generating activity, and truly allow them to perform all the work they set out to do. At these tours, members also feature vintage jewelry for sale, and sell some of their famous baked goods.

Considering that the pandemic has essentially shut the world down for the past 2 years, The Villagers are ecstatic to begin the Historic House Tours. They just held a House Tour on December 10th, and are scheduled to host a Garden Tour on March 4th, make sure to not miss it!

One of the more popular events put on by The Villagers, is their "Historic Hunt" - a scavenger hunt open to the public that takes place all around Miami. Susan was a brand new member when she did her very first Historic Hunt, and was unaware how serious and competitive it was - she was zipping around Miami with two other (at the time) strangers and actually was part of the winning team! Definitely an event we all need to check out.

MAKING A DIFFERENCE

The Villagers have funded many projects



throughout Coral Gables. From restoration of artifacts at the Merrick House and Coral Gables Library, historic artwork at City Hall, to restoration of the Alhambra Water Tower and work at the Biltmore. They have funded restoration of facilities for scouts, including for Boy Scout Troop 7 and Camp Mahachee for the Girl Scouts of Tropical Florida. Others include Coco Plum Woman's Club. Coral Gables Congregational Church, Coral Gables Museum, University of Miami, Venetian Pool, and, of course, the Douglas Entrance where it all began. The Villagers currently award around \$60,000 per year to these venues in need

Villagers Assist Actors' Playhouse with Historic Renovation

The Villagers recently presented a check for \$7,867 to representatives of Coral Gables' Actors' Playhouse. The funds were used to replace the building's 15-year-old outdated carpet in the lobby and theater aisles and was designed to complement the theater's historic terrazzo floors.

The project is part of an overall renovation of the Garden Club's headquarters, housed in the original 1920s Guard House of the Biltmore Hotel. Previously The Villagers contributed to replacing the original entry door. The door's unique silhouette required it to be custom-made as well as fabricated to meet the current Miami-Dade hurricane impact code.
